



A Fair Deal for Waltham Forest

Standing up for residents to get more resources on police numbers and public health alongside a new hospital as Council announces extra £5.5m investment

Waltham Forest Council has unveiled a multi-million pound support package focused on younger and older residents who have been worst affected by the pandemic, alongside a new lobbying campaign to ensure the borough gets a Fair Deal from central Government.

A £5.5m funding pot has been announced including a £1.4m investment in children's services; a £400,000 investment to help people in the borough age well; and £230,000 of investment to connect Waltham Forest residents with good jobs.

This will be accompanied by a lobbying campaign asking the Government to ensure that Waltham Forest gets a Fair Deal and receives the level of support it deserves. The inequality with other parts of London is clear from the number of police officers working in Waltham



Forest; in the outdated formula that decides our public health funding; and in the dilapidated state of Whipps Cross Hospital. Cllr Grace Williams, Leader of the Council, said: "The extra investment from the Council is targeted at those most affected by the pandemic as well as to make Waltham Forest a more equal place.

"Our young people need opportunities and a chance to develop their skills - and so we are bringing new green job opportunities for them to develop.

"Older residents should be able to enjoy aging well in Waltham Forest and be sure that their voices are heard and valued. We must do all we can to reduce inequalities in our communities and

remove the barriers that too many people face.

"The recent cut to Universal Credit will mean some of the borough's lowest-income households will be facing a hard winter. That's why we need the Government to step up and give Waltham Forest a Fair Deal.

"For too long our borough has suffered from the

perception that places like Westminster or Tower Hamlets somehow need more money and resources than us. These are dangerously outdated views of inner and outer London that are plain wrong and do a disservice to our residents."

Why a Fair Deal for Waltham Forest is so important

When I was elected Leader, I spoke about my values and how these would drive the work of this Council. Key to these values is fairness.

Over the coming months, I will be focussing on making sure that there is a Fair Deal for all our residents, for this council, and for our borough.

As we move into the winter, we know many of our residents are facing a cost of living crisis. Families who would normally manage to get by are now at risk of severe hardship because of the perfect storm created by cuts to universal credit, rising food and energy prices, and tax rises.

In the last decade we've seen rising in-work poverty, spiralling housing costs and mounting debt.

The picture is still emerging, but these trends have only been accelerated by the pandemic and Waltham Forest is vulnerable to these national challenges.

In the very latest figures, almost half the children in our borough – 47 per cent - live in poverty. More than 21,000 households in the borough are fuel poor. We have the third highest fuel poverty rate in London and are in the top-10 worst affected areas in England. 16,000 adults in Waltham Forest went a whole day without eating in the past

year due to lack of money. Nearly 1 in 6 households in our borough struggle to access food. These figures are shocking and deeply concerning.

We will do all that we can to help those families and provide a safety net where the government refuses to help. We will continue to provide discretionary payments to cover fuel bills, assist our food banks, and support a money and debt advice service.

However, it is clear that Waltham Forest deserves a Fair Deal from central Government.

For too long our residents

have had to use a hospital in desperate need of rebuilding. We need funding and the green light to give us a Fair Deal on a new hospital.

As far back as 2014/15, Waltham Forest had the largest gap in London between our actual grant allocation and the level of need as assessed by the Department of Health. We need a Fair Deal on public health funding.

I was simply astounding when the Met Police recently announced an extra 650 officers - and our borough didn't get a single one. Does anyone think this is a fair deal for Waltham Forest?

I want to show residents that we are on their side. When we can act locally we will do so, and if we can't do it alone we will lobby for the resources our borough needs. I have written to the Chancellor to make the case for Waltham Forest.

On a sombre note, I would like to pay my respects to MP Sir David Amess who was stabbed while holding a surgery with constituents in Leigh-on-Sea on Friday 15 October.

An attack on an elected representative is an attack on democracy. His family, friends, and colleagues are grieving his loss.

Citizenship ceremonies take place each week in Waltham Forest Town Hall

UK citizen is the culmination of a happy time living here in the borough.

Adrian is one of around 1,400 people who gain their citizenship in the borough each year. Citizenship ceremonies take place most Wednesday mornings amidst the grandeur of the Town Hall's chamber, where each applicant pledges an oath where they promise to respect the UK's rights, freedoms and laws.

At the end of the ceremony, an invited dignitary such as the Mayor of Waltham Forest, presents them with a certificate of citizenship to commemorate the occasion and confirm their status as a UK citizen.

After living in the the UK for eight years, architectural studio administrator Dumitrita recently realised her ambition to buy her first flat in Leytonstone.

But for Dumitrita, gaining citizenship is a bigger cause for celebration: "The ceremony

was beautiful, the Mayor was there, and she was lovely. I really enjoyed it!" Dumitrita says she stayed in Waltham Forest as she loves the variety and energy of her adopted hometown of Leytonstone: "It's multicultural and diverse, it feels like a safe place to live, and I feel comfortable to just walk around."

The process for gaining citizenship starts with an application to the Home Office in the UK government. There are a number of ways in which someone may be eligible for citizenship, such as being born in the UK or having family here, being married to a British citizen, or having settled status under the EU settlement scheme. In the last decade, around 150,000 people have successfully gained citizenship in the UK each year.

Aron from Venezuela walked out onto Fellowship Square proudly holding his citizenship certificate. After living in the UK for seven years, he sees himself living here for a long time: "The ceremony was really nice - it was really special."

"Officially from today, I can name Waltham Forest as my home. I can say I'm from Walthamstow now, so I see myself living here forever. I like the community, I love the UK."

Community rally together in response to flooding

When heavy rain caused flooding in July residents like Gail Penfold stepped up to support their neighbours

The community response mobilised within hours of the floods engulfing parts of Waltham Forest on Sunday 25 July helped to ensure the most vulnerable people were safe and limit the damage of the flooding. Community Champion Gail Penfold was one of the first residents to act.

"The way the community came together was incredible. Groups like mine, Wood Street First, and foodbanks interlinked and worked as a team with no boundaries.

"If something was needed it was sourced. Many people who didn't know each other were coming to the rescue of others. This is what I love about Waltham Forest.

"We had volunteers knee deep in water for hours just off the

Billet roundabout area and surrounding road network, giving safe driving advice and directions on alternative safe routes to pedestrians and cyclists as the underpass became impassable. As a key area to get in and out of the borough, it was critical traffic could continue to flow and that emergency services could get around.

"Our approach was really methodical. I checked the banks of the River Ching, visited every road in my area, liaised with the environment agency and TFL. The Street Angels' Scheme Saltbags made a good sandbag substitute.

"The Waltham Forest Flood Relief Facebook page set up by Paul Moran was a vital communication channel. With over 1500 followers it is still helping victims today.

"LBWF refuse crews did a great job in flood affected areas, collecting water damaged goods whilst staying covid safe when entering properties.

"Their extra efforts during this tragedy were greatly appreciated. I send a big thank you to everyone who helped."

Gail, alongside many other residents across the borough, is a great example of the community spirit that was critical to the boroughwide response.

"He also loved to walk and to talk to people about his life, local history, and nature. It was so comforting to think that the Woodland Walk in Leyton Jubilee Park will combine two of his passions, and help the children of Waltham Forest to keep learning about nature and enjoying a place that was so special to him."

Our response to the Climate Emergency

Empowering young people and delivering green job opportunities key to success to becoming net-zero by 2030

As global leaders prepare to meet in Glasgow for the COP26 summit at the end of October, Waltham Forest Council has agreed an action plan to tackle the climate emergency through behaviour change and delivering more employment and education opportunities, especially for young people who will be worst affected.

Key actions include planting more trees, creating green jobs and pathways to green jobs, retrofitting Council housing stock and showcasing the pioneering Eco showhome, and boosting local biodiversity.

There will be at least 8,000 additional trees planted before March 2022, 600 of which will be mature. These will add to over 100,000 that are already growing across the borough, 56,000 of which are directly managed by the Council.

The Council will continue to

do its part and work to make significant local change on climate, and work in partnership with young people, harnessing their passion for a national and international fair deal on climate.

A key part of this has seen the Suntrap Centre in Epping Forest undergo a £4.5 million refurbishment to create London’s first climate campus for young people, delivering a curriculum that provides them with the skills to take meaningful action to protect our environment. In early November a Youth Climate Summit will bring young people together to discuss the crisis.

Cllr Clyde Loakes, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: “Our Climate Emergency response is bold - and it needs to be if we are to reach our ambition of being a net-zero borough by 2030.

“We are taking serious action to address the climate emergency and make sure there is a fair deal on climate for the next generation. Young people have been at the forefront in campaigning to tackle the climate emergency. But it isn’t just their responsibility. They have told us what they want, now we want to work with them to keep us accountable. I am really excited to work with local schools to see what comes out of the first Youth Climate Summit.”

As the world looks to Glasgow for COP26, we speak to a local activist closer to home about her roots in Waltham Forest and the role of young people in addressing climate change.

Serena Bashal has successfully turned her passion into a career, balancing her job at energy company SSE with global climate advocacy. As an official UN Climate Change Conference of Youth (COY) delegate, the 23-year-old from Chingford will travel to Glasgow for the event which runs a few days ahead of COP26.

“Waltham Forest is an amazing borough, we have so much nature around us,” Serena says when asked about the local influence on her work. “Once you have this connection with the natural environment, it can really start to impact your thought process deeply.”

Having attended school in Chingford and then college in Leyton, Serena is passionate about the role of education in empowering the climate leaders of tomorrow.

“At the end of the day, we are the next generation of leaders, the next CEOs, the next Prime Ministers.

“If we want to make change, the next generation of leaders has to be educated and empowered.”

Hundreds of volunteers and schools take part in the Bulb Bonanza and Big Autumn Clean

Volunteers and school students got digging over the weekend of 22-24 October, planting 100,000 bulbs for this year's Waltham Forest Bulb Bonanza.

The bulbs were given out by the Council for free as part of Waltham Forest Council's continuing commitment to help tackle the climate emergency.

The planting in public green spaces, school grounds and local parks took place alongside the Big Autumn Clean, where schools, community and resident groups were out litter picking and helping clean-up their local neighbourhoods, collecting tonnes of rubbish from our public spaces.

Cllr Clyde Loakes, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "The

Bulb Bonanza and Big Autumn Clean was another exciting, community-led project that saw hundreds of residents in Waltham Forest doing their bit to help tackle the climate emergency and protecting our important green spaces.

"We know that flowers lift our spirits and make us proud of where we live.

"When spring arrives next year, everyone in the borough will be able to enjoy glorious colours as the flowers bloom and help our vital pollinators thrive in their natural habitats."

Home improvements to tackle the Climate Emergency

Waltham Forest Council and housing partners Aston Group demonstrate range of eco-friendly ideas in fully modernised Walthamstow show home

An ordinary Victorian house on Greenleaf Road, Walthamstow, has been retrofitted with the latest environmental improvements to showcase a wide variety of ways to improve a home's energy efficiency, tackle the Climate Emergency, and save money on fuel bills.

The council-owned four-bedroom house, nearly 120 years old, has been fully modernised into an innovative, sustainable home of the future.

The EcoHome was a top attraction of recent Open House London events in the borough, with more than 200 guests stopping by over two weekends to find out about tips they could take to make a difference at their properties.

Improvements made at 47 Greenleaf Road include:

- **Air source heat pump**, which extracts cold air and pumps out hot air, like a reverse home freezer.
- Installation of **LED lighting** throughout the home could save as much as £40 a year.
- **A++ rated double-glazed windows** that can save the average semi-detached property £95 per year.
- **Solid wall insulation**, creating annual cost savings of £341 and CO2 savings of 890kg
- **Solar PV and battery storage**, creating annual cost savings of £609 and CO2 savings of 853kg.

The improvements have increased the property's energy performance rating from E to A. Over 50 per cent of harmful

emissions in Waltham Forest come from houses, much through lost heat and wasted energy.

Cllr Louise Mitchell, Cabinet Member for Housing and Homelessness Prevention, said: "I was quite shocked to learn that housing is the largest contributor to carbon emissions in the borough.

"It's vital we show leadership to reduce the carbon footprint of our homes. Not only will it help reduce the impact on our environment, but it will save households money on energy bills. This could make a real difference and prevent people having to choose between heating or eating."

School Streets help reduce toxic air pollution

Cleaner air for children and parents at drop-off and pickup times

Parents and children in Waltham Forest are working with schools to take action and reduce traffic pollution. Since 2019, Waltham Forest Council has invited schools to apply to become School Streets, which create traffic-free zones in nearby roads at drop-off and pickup times, reducing air pollution, improving safety, and encouraging walking and cycling.

According to a recent consultation by the Council, 90 per cent of parents support School Streets. 19 schools have signed up to School Streets since 2019, almost a quarter of all schools in Waltham Forest, with St. Saviours Primary School and Connaught School for Girls the latest to join.

Newport School, Leyton, joined School Streets in April 2021. Head of School Ms Ashley

Perridge said: “We listened to pupils, parents and the local community, and the message that came through was that our children’s safety was being put at risk by the congestion on the nearby roads.

“Our pupils really helped educate the parents, which meant this was a great community-led initiative to improve their experience of coming to school every day.”

Stefania Gutu, a parent of a Newport School pupil, said: “During the school run we’d all be dodging cars and there were unpleasant fumes in the air, bringing children into this environment just isn’t fair on them.

“School Streets has made a huge difference, it’s much safer and calmer, you can actually talk to your children about their day, hold their hands as you listen to their stories, these are moments that I’ll cherish for the rest of my life.”

Cllr Clyde Loakes, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: “We are committed to making sure every pupil in Waltham Forest can travel to and from school safely.

“It’s great that so many parents, schools and children are working together to make the school-run a more pleasant experience for all. Any school located within a controlled parking zone in Waltham Forest can apply, get in touch with our team who will help you get on the road to cleaner air.”

Noel Nash is a regular and finds the walks help him exercise before a planned hip operation. “I used to do the full walks, now I only go part of the way because of my hip.

“But I still like to come along to meet my friends and get the fresh air and exercise. I hope to

keep it up after my operation as I know it’ll help with my recovery.”

John Gooch attends Feel Good Walks with his friend Yvonne Kelly and said: “It gets us out each week walking and exercising, we really look forward to it. And you can come and go as you please, you don’t have to commit.”

Yvonne has ankylosing spondylitis, an arthritis that affects parts of her spine, and has found the walks help with her condition. For Yvonne they

are chance to exchange ideas and talk with a friendly group that have quickly become her friends.

Yvonne said: “During the lockdown, we went out for walks on our own. But that made me really appreciate the social side of these walks. You meet a variety of people who have led very interesting lives, and you often don’t realise you have walked that far because you are continuing the story.”

“It’s much more enjoyable, when you are doing it with different people, as everyone has a story to tell.”

A Fair Deal on policing

The local Police force has been devastated by over a decade of cuts. We have worked together to find ways to reduce the impact of these cuts but this can only take us so far. The Metropolitan Police recently announced an uplift to local policing, including 650 additional frontline police officers. However, none of these will be deployed in the borough.

- As a rate per population, the overall level of crime in Waltham Forest over the last two years ranks 18th out of 32 London Boroughs
- Waltham Forest has a relatively high proportion of residents who say they are worried about crime (63 per cent), this has increased steadily in recent years
- Only five of the seventeen boroughs selected for the new officers have a lower overall rate of crime than Waltham Forest

We have fewer police resources than similar areas of London, and it is having an impact on our residents' safety and confidence. We need a fair deal on police numbers and resources.



A Fair Deal on public health

Our public health services have been at the forefront of the fight against COVID, but we have one of the lowest public health budgets in London, based on an outdated formula from 2011.

- Health services locally are facing more pressure than ever with residents waiting longer to access GPs and finding it harder to make dentist appointments, or even to find a dentist taking on NHS patients at all.
- Local authorities' public health grant funding has reduced by over £700 million in real terms between 2015/16 and 2019/20
- Waltham Forest's funding for Local Outbreak Plans was less than half the allocation of Hackney and over £1m less than Islington, despite having a larger population

Neighbouring boroughs get a far bigger share. We need a fair deal on Public Health budgets.

A Fair Deal on a new hospital

On Sunday 25 July a major incident was declared at Whipps Cross. Heavy rain caused severe flooding, loss of power, and significant damage to the building. A significant number of planned surgeries and outpatient appointments were cancelled. This incident has further highlighted the urgent need for a new hospital and redeveloped estate.

- The Whipps Cross hospital buildings are over 100 years old and the estate has one of the highest backlog maintenance bills in the NHS
- Flooding in July led to the loss of 168 beds and 12 surgical theatres, while 100 inpatients were transferred to other hospitals. 582 planned surgeries and over 100 outpatient appointments were cancelled
- The #WhippsWontWait community campaign was launched on Thursday 7 October. Currently there are over 5,000 petition signatures

Whipps Cross hospital is not fit to deliver modern treatment. We need funding and the green light to give us a fair deal on a new hospital.

Thinking differently about autism

Lamar Mendes enjoys nothing more than catching up with the latest celeb gossip, loves going to gigs, hanging out in the Westfield Centre, and shopping for sportswear



Lamar Mendes from Chingford

So far, so typically teenager. But the well-spoken 17-year-old from Chingford must overcome more challenges than many young people his age.

For Lamar has severe autism, a lifelong developmental disability which affects how he communicates and interacts with the world.

By his own admission he can find himself crippled with anxiety – made worse by people’s inability to understand him.

His voice trembles with frustration as he makes an impassioned plea for people to make the effort to help him lead his best possible life.

“There are loads of things I want to say, so many things,” he says when asked what he wants the public to know about him. “People just don’t understand me. I try to explain myself, but they don’t get it.

“Please don’t judge me because it sets me off. I notice it when people treat me differently, and it makes me feel mad and upset. Everyone is different, and I need help. It hurts when people look and stare, you feel they are asking, ‘What kind of person is he? He should not be here.’ That makes me more anxious.”

The anxiety can turn to frustration and in turn, frustration can turn to aggression.

What helps is his music. He’s a huge fan of Little Mix and keeps up-to-date with the latest news: “There are loads of celebs that have said they’ve felt different.

Leigh-Anne has spoken about being the only black member in the band and Jessie and talked about the nasty comments she gets about her looks.”

Lamar has seen them live on several occasions: “I enjoy them so much.” But it is more than just the music, gigs help him, if only for a little while, forget that he is different: “I like being about with other people, I love my music so much.

“When singing or writing my music I do not pay attention to what’s around me. Mum says it makes me forget I have autism.”

While Little Mix may not be to Mum’s taste, there is no doubt in her mind that music has played a major part in helping her son cope with his anxiety.

Jacqui, a retired job centre manager, never forgets the day she was told her son was autistic. At the time he was just coming up to his second birthday, and she was concerned because he wasn’t behaving like his two elder sisters were at that age.

When she was told it was a body blow: “Everything was spinning. At first I found myself grieving the loss of the aspirations I had for Lamar, it took me some time to come to terms with it. But then I started reading all about it and knocking on lots of doors to find out what was out there and what I could do.”

For Jacqui the idea that Waltham Forest will become an Autism Friendly Borough is a welcome one.

Asked what she hopes would be achieved she quickly rattles off a list: “More understanding for Lamar, and better joined up services would be a big help - it can be exhausting trying to get things sorted... and more respite care.”



Local football teams send clear message that there is No Space for Hate in the beautiful game



"I'm seen as the Muslim girl who played football."

Zainab El-Mouden is known for her enthusiasm and positivity in the Leyton Orient changing room. But off the pitch the 18-year-old often must deal with the looks, remarks and reactions that come from being a hijab-wearing footballer:

"As someone who has travelled across London to play for Pro Direct in Enfield and now Leyton Orient, I get all kinds of reactions from others.

"Lot of people say, 'go you' and offer words of encouragement and support but the interactions aren't always positive. On my way to training recently, this guy just laughed at me as I waited for the bus. The way he laughed hit a nerve. I've dealt with Islamophobia before, but the way he laughed, it was as if I couldn't be any good at football and for a short period it really knocked me.

"In many social circles I'm seen as the 'Muslim girl who plays football.' Although my school was very diverse and had many Muslim people, there are fewer players like me playing club football.

"I'd like to see the Muslim population better represented in the woman's game, but change won't happen overnight. I try to make sure that nothing gets in the way of me enjoying my football and learning from the people I meet along the way."

AFC Leyton's Lindsay Sibbons (36) was a leading youth player along with her twin sister, enjoying trials at Arsenal and England. After 10 years away from football, Lindsay recently returned to playing:

"Woman's football is so much stronger now. We have people of all different cultures – it's fantastic. I really like playing with the younger girls, giving them confidence and helping them improve and enjoy the game.


"I work full-time and I'm a mum of three, so Tuesdays and Sundays are where I forget everything and play the game I love.

"My advice for anybody who wants to play football should just go for it, no matter your culture, playing standard or whether you have a disability. Everyone who runs AFC Leyton is amazing, and new players are always welcome."


This short course teaches men how they can challenge misogyny as well as safely intervene if they see a woman or girl being harassed on the streets.

Revitalising space & transforming waste in Chingford Mount

Waltham Forest Council has brought a derelict shop in Chingford Mount back to life to host a series of events, workshops, and pop-ups in the coming year - the first is *Plaster Works*

Plaster Works is being hosted by Blackhorse Workshop in partnership with Good Waste, the sustainable design studio, and will run in the council owned space, the newly renovated meanwhile space at 228 Chingford Mount Road, which is the former site of the iconic County Cameras Shop.

The public will be able to experience the fantastic method of turning plaster dust into beautiful objects. The idea was inspired by research showing skips full of plasterboard which ends up in landfill. Blackhorse Workshop and Good Waste developed a process to extract the plaster powder, turning it into plaster dust. The material was even used to design the shop's interior and furniture.

The project is working with

local secondary schools and unemployed young people to deliver the experience and find creative solutions to local building waste, providing an amazing opportunity for the local community.

Harriet Warden, Creative Director at Blackhorse Workshop, said: "We're excited to be bringing our work to Chingford Mount, and thank you to everyone who has stopped by as we've been working on the shop. It's been fantastic to explore the possibilities of this material together with the

expertise of Good Waste. The project is all about reuse, from the derelict camera shop itself to an old agricultural machine repurposed as a plasterboard crusher, and of course the waste plasterboard.

"But just as importantly, it's about having fun making together in a creative space. By demonstrating how good design can re-imagine how we see things, we hope to show how we can make better use of the resources and materials that we already have."

Good Waste has recently been nominated for the Dezeen awards in the Homeware category, and items created in its last project sold in Selfridges, highlighting the quality of design.

Plaster Works is just the first of many creative events to be

held at 228 Chingford Mount for the local community. Waltham Forest Council is currently working on plans to hold a sustainable fashion festival and a Christmas market amongst other events in the run up to Christmas and through 2022.



Driving your career forward

We spoke with local resident Jovita about her experience retraining as an HGV driver with support from Waltham Forest Jobs



Jovita found a dream new career with help from Waltham Forest Jobs

“I’m really pleased about where I am now – it’s like a dream come true. I was just scrolling Facebook one day and by accident saw a post from Paul Coster from Waltham Forest Council advertising a nearby job.

“I asked Paul if there were jobs were available and he mentioned an apprenticeship as an HGV driver. We spoke on the phone and he talked me through how I’d apply, and I went for it. If it wasn’t for Paul, I’d never have known about the job.

For me, I’ve realised I need to be in a job that I love – otherwise I won’t be happy

“My father was a bus driver in Lithuania, and he’d always take me on long trips. Ever since then I’ve wanted to be a driver – I like to say it’s in my blood. As soon as I could learn to drive at 16 I did. But, although I’d always wanted to drive for a living, I hadn’t driven much in the ten years since I moved to London from Lithuania, and I wasn’t confident that I’d pass the requirements to become a lorry driver.

“The apprenticeship that the Council advertised could provide a more comfortable way in, because it gave me time shadowing other drivers, and time to build my skills.

“I’m not the only woman on the team – the manager that hired me is female and has her own lorry licence. It’s true that there are more men than women in the team, but I’ve felt welcomed and respected at every stage.

“The team were so supportive when I passed the test, and kept pushing me, telling me “You can do it – soon you’ll be better than us.” To any women worried about entering a male-dominated field, I’d say: “Be brave. We’re equal to men – our brains are the same and we can do the same. Show what we can do!”

“The next stage for me is to apply to become a Class 1 HGV driver, which I plan to do in the next two months. In the future, who knows. When my son is old enough, I could be a long-distance driver. I’d love to travel more, and see different places – and if you can do that as part of your job, why not?

“For me, I’ve realised I need to be in a job that I love – otherwise I won’t be happy. To anyone who’s scared of following their passion, even if it means a huge change to their life and career, I would say: just go for it. I am just sorry I didn’t do it earlier.”

Green Jobs Fair connects employers with tomorrow’s climate leaders

Jobseekers descend on Waltham Forest for green careers expo

On Friday 15 May 2021, London Wildlife Trust hosted the Green Jobs Fair to bring eco-friendly employers and young hopefuls together at Walthamstow Wetlands’ Engine House.

Among a number of local events leading up to the COP26 climate summit in Glasgow next month, the expo aimed to draw 16–25-year-olds from under-represented backgrounds towards new careers in the green sector.

Through skills and training opportunities, ‘speed meets’ and CV polishing sessions, the capacity Engine House crowd saw talks from London Wildlife Trust alumni, conservation demonstrations and tour guide trials. The event also featured employers such as the natural History Museum, London Youth and Natural England.

It comes just days after Waltham Forest Council’s response to the landmark Climate Emergency Commission report, putting young people at the centre of plans to become a net zero borough by 2030.

Attendees were very positive about the fair, including biology student Ben Winders of Walthamstow, who said “Basically at the end of your degree you want to get as many hands-on experiences as you can, I think the fair here is a great opportunity to get in touch with people.”





All motor vehicles except permit holders, will be prohibited from entering the pedestrian and cycle zone during the hours of operation. Permits allowing vehicles to enter the pedestrian

and cycle zone will be available to residents of and employees of businesses and organisations at premises located within or only accessible from the pedestrian and cycle zone, and to disabled person’s badge holders who have a bona fide reason to enter or leave a vehicle in the pedestrian and cycle zone, by application to the Council. Any vehicle that is already within the pedestrian and cycle zone prior to its commencement of operation will be permitted to leave. Further exemptions will apply to: Emergency service vehicles; Council Waste Services; other key Council services (e.g. Social Services); Mobility Services vehicles; and Public service vehicles (e.g. Community Transport, Dial-a-Ride). v. the south and south-east sides –

- (a) suspend permit parking space for a total of 7 metres opposite Parkstone Road/outside No. 16a WYA;
- (b) suspend the single yellow line waiting restriction and 4 metres of permit parking space outside Nos. 42 and 44 WYA;
- (c) suspend the single yellow line waiting restriction and 3 metres of loading space outside No. 52 WYA and No. 1 Hatton Terrace;

2. The general effect of the Order will be, only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed, to prohibit vehicles (except works vehicles) from entering, proceeding, waiting or loading for any purpose, at any time, in the roads mentioned in the Schedule of this Notice:

3. Whilst works are being carried out and only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed no person shall cause or permit any vehicle to wait or load for any purpose, at any time, within 15 metres of the junction of any road adjoining the roads mentioned in the Schedule of this Notice.

4. Whilst the prohibitions referred to in item 2 above remain in force, advance warning signage and alternative routes for traffic shall be in place.

5. Whilst works are being carried out and only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed any one-way working or no-entry prohibitions in any roads or parts of roads mentioned in the Schedule of this Notice would be temporarily suspended.

6. Vehicles waiting or loading in disregard of the Order would be removed.

7. The restrictions mentioned above would not apply in relation to any vehicle being used -

(a) in connection with the said works; or

(b) for ambulance, fire brigade or police purposes (if the works allow)

8. The Order will come into operation on **29th October 2021** and would be valid for a maximum period of 18 months or until the works are completed, whichever is the sooner (this applies to all roads mentioned in the Schedule and allows for unforeseen constraints which may abort works until a future time).

NOTE: These works would not be carried out simultaneously in all roads but in a sequence as directed by the Council. *Leaflets would be distributed, and signage placed in advance of any works in the above-mentioned roads which would give more specific details on the exact dates of the effects and of any temporary traffic management as necessary.

1. The Council of the London Borough of Waltham Forest **HEREBY GIVES NOTICE** that it intends on making an Order to enable conversion of traffic calming cushions to humps, the provision of other traffic calming measures and resurfacing works to be carried out in a safe and efficient manner.

2. The general effect of the Order would be, only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed or, where applicable, covered - to prohibit vehicles from entering, proceeding, waiting or loading for any purpose "at any time" in the roads or parts of roads mentioned in the Schedule of this notice.

3. Vehicular access to properties affected by these temporary measures will be maintained wherever possible, subject to the extent and operation of the closures.

4. Whilst the prohibitions referred to in item 2 above remain in force, alternative routes for traffic would be indicated by traffic signs.

5. Vehicles waiting or loading in disregard of this Order would be removed.

6. During the works the one-way operation for Wyatts Lane E17 will be temporarily suspended. Also, any one way working in any roads or parts of roads adjoining Wyatts Lane E17 will also be suspended.

7. The prohibitions mentioned above would not apply in relation to any vehicle being used -

(a) in connection with the said works; or

(b) for ambulance, fire brigade or police purposes (if the works allow).

8. The Order will come into operation from **11th November 2021** and would be valid for a maximum period of 6 months or until the works are completed, whichever is the sooner.

NOTE: These works would not be carried out simultaneously in all roads mentioned in this notice but in a sequence as directed by the Council. Signage will be placed in advance of any works in these roads which would give more specific details on the exact dates of the prohibitions, effects of any temporary traffic management and diversion routes as necessary. Construction works will be carried out during daytime or overnight. Works in Queens Road is estimated around the end of November 2021 and for Orford Road in the second week of January 2022.

1. The Council of the London Borough of Waltham Forest **HEREBY GIVES NOTICE** that it intends on making an Order to allow access to a temporary parking area whilst construction works are being carried out on land adjacent to the highway and for dropped kerb (crossover) works to be carried out in a safe and efficient manner.

2. The general effect of the Order would be - only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed or, where applicable, covered - to

suspend free regulated partial footway parking space and restrict vehicles from waiting or loading for any purpose:

a) between the hours of **8am and 4pm Mondays-Fridays in Montague Road E11 (MNT)** on the:

(i) west side - between a point 8.5 metres south of the southern kerb line of Cookes Close and the southern wall of No. 26 MNT;

(ii) east side - between the southern boundary of No 91 MNT and the common boundary of Nos. 26 and 28 MNT;

(iii) west side - between a point 6 metres north of its junction with Acacia Road northwards for a distance of 24 metres; and

(iv) east side - between a point 6 metres north of its junction with Briscoe Close northwards for a distance of 19 metres;

b) "at any time" in **Montague Road E11 (MNT)**:

(i) east side - between a point 19 metres south of the southern boundary of No 91 MNT southwards for a distance of 7 metres;

(ii) east side - between a point 19 metres north of the northern kerb line of Briscoe Close northwards for a distance of 7 metres;

3. Vehicles waiting or loading in disregard of the Order would be removed.

4. The Order would come into operation

on **25th November 2021** and will cease to have effect when the works are completed.

5. The bans would only apply at such times and to such extent as shall be indicated by the placing and covering of the appropriate traffic signs.

6. In so far as any provision imposed by the Order conflicts or is inconsistent with any provision of any Order made under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, as amended, in the London Borough of Waltham Forest the provisions of the intended Order shall prevail only at such times and to such extent as regulatory signs are displayed in relation to the measures set out in this Order.

NOTE: Works will not be carried out simultaneously in Montague Road but in a phased approach as directed by the Council. Signage will be placed in advance of any works which would give more specific details on the exact dates of the restrictions and effects of any temporary traffic management as necessary. Phase 1 will consist of the construction of two crossovers for several weeks and upon completion, phase 2 "at any time" restrictions would apply in specific areas to allow access to new temporary off-street parking areas while construction works are taking place.




