A vision of the future

■ Fellowship Square officially opened by local school children

Local primary school children took centre stage by officially opening Fellowship Square on Thursday 15 July.

This ambitious and exciting new cultural hub for the borough came to life as our local VIPs – Marcus Powell from Jenny Hammond Primary School and Aamenah Kazi from George Mitchell School - cut the ribbon in front of their classmates, in a fitting acknowledgement that this 365-day cultural venue is for residents first and foremost.

Other specially invited VIPs included many ambulance, police and NHS frontline workers who worked tirelessly over the last 18 months to save lives and keep the community safe during the pandemic. Paying tribute to their hard work Leader Elect, Cllr Grace Williams, said the launch day “was an opportunity to say thank you for their herculean efforts during the pandemic.”

The day began when Marcus and Aamenah, our two competition winners laid their

entries into the time capsule, which will be placed in the vault underneath the steps of the town hall for a future generation to open.

More than 450 primary school pupils entered the competition asking them to imagine what life would be like in Waltham Forest in 100 years. The pandemic affected everyone, particularly children and young people, which is why they formed a key part of the Fellowship Square launch, and its message of hope.

The competition entries touched on many of the big challenges we face, not just in our borough but across our great city. Children who participated in the borough-wide competition told us about the need to tackle the inequalities that have been highlighted by the Covid pandemic and the Black Lives Matter movement, dealing with the climate emergency, alleviating poverty, and making sure our streets are safe for everyone.

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These are all priorities that the Council will tackle over the coming months. We want to work in partnership with everyone in the borough to create a Waltham Forest that is healthy, green, safe and more equal.

The official launch included jaw-dropping performances throughout the day, attended by residents, school children, and young people, inspired by William Morris poetry "The Sky is Full of Gold". Dance, aerial acrobatics and commissioned music all centred in and around the new fountain. Twelve

golden flags were also unfurled by staff and volunteers. The performance was co-created with local artists and community groups exploring the concept of fellowship.

Guests, including local nurses, artists, community leaders and police officers, were amazed by the space and how accessible it has become as well as inspired by the countless opportunities of this new cultural hub. Borough inspector Marcus Walton who attended the event said: "What an amazing transformation! I encourage everyone in the


borough to come enjoy this safe and accessible space."

From the Leader - celebrating the life of a D-Day veteran



A few weeks ago, we asked the primary school pupils of Waltham Forest to imagine life in the borough 100 years from now.

As well as robots, flying cars, transporters, and even the iPhone 112, the children saw a better, fairer, kinder world.

A world where the environment is a big concern, and poverty and hunger banished to the long distant past.

William (Bill) Allen, who passed away in June, didn't have to dream up what a passing century in Waltham Forest would bring – he lived it.

Born in the borough on December 7, 1919, he was raised on the streets of Leytonstone, then in the Municipal Borough of Leyton, Essex, clinging to the fringes of the capital.

By the time the Second World War broke out, he was a newly married man, having tied the knot with Frances.

Called up for National Service in 1940 he joined the British Army with the Royal Berkshire Infantry Regiment where his bravery and talent saw swift promotion through the ranks.

Not only that but he was chosen to be Field Marshall Bernard Montgomery's personal bodyguard in France and Germany following the D-Day landings.

Such a role in dangerous

territory saw him handling sensitive information on his motorbike without lights at night to avoid detection by the enemy.

The actions of those brave soldiers, many of whom lost their lives on the beaches of Normandy and beyond helped free the world of a tyranny, the likes of which we must hope we never witness again.

After the war he settled down with Frances and his young family in Leyton, where he remained for the rest of his days.

But even in civilian life Bill never forgot his fallen comrades and the sacrifice that they made for theirs and future generations.

Indeed, he remained a regular fixture on Armed Forces Day and at Remembrance Sunday services, where each year he laid a wreath in their memory.

Not for him though to only look back, he continued to

take an interest in our young people's lives and was involved with the Army Cadet Force and the Air Cadet Corps, both based at Whipps Cross.

And he regularly attended ceremonial events and gave speeches to the cadets as well as presenting awards.

His sense of service went further still. Until the pandemic put a stop to it, he would share his wartime exploits with pupils at local schools.


Dressed in his medals, he would tell the children about his time in the Army, and his hopes for world peace.

Showing that he had lost none of his youthful spirit, he would later join them for lunch in the dining room – where a scramble for a coveted seat next to him would ensue.

In June, the Mayor visited Bill to award him the Freedom of the Borough. It is hard to imagine a more deserving recipient.

Bill Allen was a model of the very best of the borough, and while he will be much missed, he leaves behind a legacy that will be remembered for many years to come.



Maria and family members, Alfredo and Marcela, now have a number of farms and employ 800 workers in El Salvador. It is like a big family! In 2013 one of their employees discovered three tiny coffee bushes which turned out to be a totally unique coffee species. They named it, "Bernadina" after the lady who discovered it. No other coffee has qualities quite like Bernadina and it is that which gives the L'DON blend its distinctive flavour.



Another reason L'DON uses Maria Pacas beans is the highly evolved sense of social responsibility the coffee producer brings to its activities. A new approach to fight injustice and inequalities in Waltham Forest

We will be working with residents to find the solutions needed to make Waltham Forest a fairer place to work and live.

Who you are should not determine your chances of living a good life. Yet the people who feel the full impact of inequalities do so at every stage of life, facing more barriers than others in trying to achieve their dreams.

Inequalities hold back our institutions, companies, and services from having senior teams that reflect the people they serve.

Despite lots of progress, the appalling racist abuse

that overshadowed the young England football team's brilliant achievements at Euro 2020 - and the global Black Lives Matter protests - leave us in no doubt about the scale of racial inequalities across the UK and beyond.

For our residents, barriers and prejudice can occur in lots of ways. It might be that your job application doesn't get on the shortlist because of your name, the police officer that stops you because of how you look, or being treated differently because of your beliefs, gender, or sexual orientation.

That six out of ten deaths from COVID-19 in the UK were people with a disability (ONS) highlights how starkly the pandemic has exposed inequalities and we also know that our Black and South Asian communities have been hit hard by Covid and the wider impacts of the pandemic.

I identify these issues to acknowledge that they exist and to highlight my determination to do everything I can in Waltham Forest to address them. This won't happen overnight, and there's lots of work to do.

When the government released the Sewell Report earlier this year,

denying the existence of institutional racism and discrimination, they betrayed so many people who experience inequalities every day.

That is why I've led work on the 'State of the Borough' report. We've used existing research from a range of local and national studies to understand in detail the full impact of inequalities faced by too many Waltham Forest residents.

We need to continue to celebrate our diverse communities and the achievements of so many of our people, but we also must acknowledge inequality, investigate the root causes and tackle them head on.

The report presents stark findings that make for difficult reading, but they will come as no surprise to the people who experience these inequalities every day.

Over the next few months, we will be going into our communities to work with the residents affected by inequality here in Waltham Forest.

Through a combination of one-to-one meetings, bespoke workshops with people who experience specific inequalities, an interactive online resource where everyone can input, a State of the Borough Equalities Summit in the Autumn and much more - we will be working with residents to identify the solutions needed to make Waltham Forest a fairer place to work and live.

We will initially focus on the specific challenges that impact residents' ability to make a decent living. As we reopen our economy, helping residents' access good, green jobs has never been more important. It's just as important that we work with young people to ensure they're getting the skills and training they need to succeed.

We will be working with residents on how we should address the gender and ethnicity pay-gaps, better support residents with disabilities, improve access to skills and training and more.

By working with residents throughout every step of this process, we can begin to dismantle inequalities that have held our people back for too long. This is the start of an increasingly ambitious approach to tackle inequalities across the borough together over the long term, through listening, understanding, and taking action.

Inequalities that impact our residents

The report shows the many ways people in Waltham Forest are disadvantaged



Making a living

From education to finding a job, earning a reasonable wage, or drawing a pension, there are some in Waltham Forest who face persistent and often insurmountable inequalities that limit their ability to make a decent living.

- In 2020, men in Waltham Forest earned 28 per cent more per hour on average than women.
- Three times more young workers in London are on zero-hour contracts than the national average.
- Children on free school meals in Waltham Forest are less likely to progress to higher education.
- Only four per cent of adults who are receiving hospital or community care on mental health grounds are in employment.
- The unemployment rate for residents who are in an ethnic minority and not UK born is four times higher than White, UK born residents.



Having a good start in life

- 2,500 girls in Waltham Forest are affected by period poverty.
- Children on free school meals are less likely to achieve the highest grades.
- The exam results achievement gap between boys and girls has widened.



Living a healthy life

- Single mothers represent 1/3 of households threatened by homelessness.
- A baby girl born recently in the north of the borough is predicted to live seven years longer than one born in the south.
- People of a white or mixed ethnicity, people with a disability and people who are LGBTIQ+, are more likely to smoke and to drink heavily.



Living in equal communities

- Black people were over twice as likely to be Stopped and Searched than White people in Waltham Forest.
- Seven per cent of Waltham Forest residents don't have access to the internet.
- More than 40 per cent of LGBTIQ+ Londoners have experienced physical or verbal violence, or threats of such violence in the last 12 months.



Exercising power and influence

- 43 per cent of residents with a disability said they disagreed that the Council takes account of residents' views when making decisions, compared to 21 per cent of residents without a disability.
- In Waltham Forest Council 60 per cent of our Chief Officers are White, and 63 per cent of them are men.

However

- 33 per cent of Councillors in Waltham Forest are from Black, Asian, and Minority Ethnic backgrounds, compared to a national average of 7 per cent.

“At the age of 15 I was told by a teacher that I was not ‘A’ level material. Due to a lack of confidence and not believing that as a Black girl I could become a solicitor, which was my dream, I accepted that teacher’s evaluation of me.”

“I think it’s difficult enough normally to find a job, not even a good one, just a job, when you’re young and Black and don’t have any networks or connections that can help you get a job.”

A timeline of our approach to tackling inequalities

Our commitment to make Waltham Forest more equal for everyone



In **November 2020** Waltham Forest Council committed in its Public Service Strategy to develop a long term approach to make the borough more equal for everyone.

The **June 2021** 'State of the Borough Report' was approved by Cabinet, paving the way for the Council to work with communities to identify solutions to the inequalities highlighted.

Throughout **August and September 2021** events that each focus on a specific inequality related to making a living will enable hundreds of people affected to tell their story. Events will focus on topics including zero-hour contracts, the impact of age, race, gender, disability, neurodiversity, sexuality, and religion on employment, and much more.

Through **wfequalities.commonplace.is** we'll let residents know what events we're popping up at, and there will be ways that residents can tell us what they think. We know that not everyone will want to submit views online. Face-to-face meeting can be arranged by emailing **connectingcommunities@walthamforest.gov.uk** or by initially calling 020 8496 3000 from 7am to 7pm seven days a week to express your interest.

In **Autumn 2021**, we will host Waltham Forest's first **State of the Borough Equalities Summit**. Over four days and in several locations across the borough, residents will be encouraged to join several open, interactive drop-in events.

All the feedback and input will inform a fully costed Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) Strategy focused on the theme of Making a Living.

The **State of the Borough Equalities Summit** will give residents in Waltham Forest more ways to tell us how we should address inequalities.

Across Waltham Forest, we'll facilitate a series of talks, panels, performances, debates, and other open-access events that are led by local people, including faith and community leaders, schools, charities, and local businesses.

There will also be opportunities to take part by:

- **Sharing experiences**
- **Hosting roundtable discussions**
- **Taking part in debates**
- **Attending as an audience member**

This process will result in an Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) Strategy which will clearly outline how we will tackle longstanding inequalities. This will be available in accessible formats and have clear, identifiable recommendations and actions which the Council, partners and residents can all work towards.

By coming together and shaping our community's approach to equality, diversity, and inclusion, we can make Waltham Forest a place where everyone can reach their potential.

Local community shares views on transformation of Lea Bridge Station junction

Local people in Lea Bridge have got involved in public engagement about plans to transform three Council-owned sites around Lea Bridge Station

Waltham Forest Council plans to develop the three Lea Bridge Station sites for the benefit of residents, and has signed an agreement with developer London Square to deliver:

- 45 jobs, 17 apprenticeships, 138 training opportunities and 15 paid work placements
- The new entrance to Lea Bridge Station with a new station plaza
- Around 300 new homes, with an ambition for 50 per cent affordable homes (with 60 per cent of those for London Affordable Rent and 40 per cent for shared ownership)
- A net increase in trees
- 750 square metres of high-quality publicly accessible green space
- Community and Cultural Hub for Lea Bridge Road
- Commercial space
- Children's play space
- £350,000 spent in the local supply chain
- 'Community Chest Fund' developed with the community

A planning application for the new station entrance was approved in January 2020.

Recent public engagement included a project website (**lbss. community**), newsletters, in-person surveys at Lea Bridge Station, surveys of local businesses, and workshops with students at local schools.

The final proposals will be shared later in August

London Square is now considering all the feedback received as it develops its final proposals, in particular local people's ideas about what the community hub could be used for.

If you've been vaccinated:

- There is still a risk that you can catch the virus and pass to others – test twice a week even if you feel fine



I'm proud to have been a part of the WFTA since it was founded in 1999 to promote friendship, information exchange

and mutual understanding of cultural, recreational, and commercial activities. For over 20 years we have delivered impactful community projects that promote health, heritage, and intergenerational learning.

We work closely with community groups, churches,

embassies, and educational outlets across Waltham Forest, but our membership is by and large people from the Windrush generation – which describes the ship that brought the first groups of West Indian migrants to the UK in 1948 - and their descendants.

The lives of so many from the Windrush generation changed in 2017, as hundreds of people who call England home were required to provide proof of their residency prior to 1973 or face deportation, losing their jobs and being ripped from their families.

people affected across London to learn more about and help to access the Windrush Compensation Scheme.

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

 - prohibit vehicles (except works vehicles) from entering, proceeding, waiting or loading for any purpose, at any time, in: **Hickman Avenue E4** (east/west arm) - between Jack Farms Way and Jubilee Avenue

- (north/south arm); and
- restrict vehicles (except works vehicles) from waiting or loading for any purpose, at any time, in: **Jack's Farms Way E4** (north/south arm) - between Hickman Avenue and Celebration Way.

Members Allowances

ELECTED MEMBERS (COUNCILLORS) OF AN AUTHORITY ARE ENTITLED UNDER THE MEMBERS' ALLOWANCES SCHEME TO RECEIVE REMUNERATION FOR THE DUTIES THEY PERFORM. THIS SCHEME IS SET OUT IN THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COUNCIL.

The scheme is governed by the Local Government & Housing Act, 1989, as amended and the Local Authorities (Members' Allowances) (England) Regulations, 2003. All Councillors are entitled to a basic allowance to cover their democratic duties. Some Councillors also receive a Special Responsibility Allowance (SRA) reflecting the level of additional duties they undertake (see the table

below). Councillors who hold more than one post are only entitled to claim the SRA with the greatest value. In appropriate circumstances, Councillors can claim an allowance towards carers' costs, travelling and subsistence costs when carrying out certain duties outside the Borough.

The Council carries out a full review of its Councillors' Allowances Scheme, having regard to the London Councils' Independent Panel report, at the start of each 4-year electoral term, and confirms it annually. The current rates of allowances were agreed by the Council on 22nd of April 2021

The following table sets out the current rates of Members' Allowances for the Municipal Year, 2021/22. Also set out are payments made to individual Members in the financial year 2020/21. The 2020/21 figures also reflect that some Councillors had changes of responsibility during the year.



