

Hi Andrea,

Here are my submissions to the new Stage 2 Consultations, this time to the correct email address.

Many apologies for my error when I used an old no longer available email, and not using the [REDACTED] email address given in Sarah Parsons` email to us all dated 2nd December 2022 to use for you.

I have now deleted the incorrect email at walthamforest.gov.uk from my address book, and will notify all those copied in to my earlier submission of the correct email address to use.

With respect to the Draft Hearing Programme:

I would like to speak on Tuesday morning 7th March 2023 on Matter 1, HRA, Habitats Regulations and other legal requirements on Air Quality and Sustainability Appraisal, in relation to Footpath Mapping on the Council`s website and the Meridian Line Rail link to Stratford, previously know as Hall Farm Curve.

On the afternoon of Tuesday 7th March 2023 on Matter 2, Vision, Strategic Objectives, Sustainable Development and Scale of Growth, in relation to the failure of the Council to update the Policy documents for Priorities for Transport, with no new documents since Autumn 2020. For example, there is a link to a report dating back 13 years (Physical Infrastructure page 11 of 99, paragraph 3.29 and Figure 3.5) with reference to a WF officer`s report (I put a link on our web page on Railfuture`s website, which sadly we have not kept up-to-date) in support of the Hall Farm Curve project dated January 2010. This link still works from the my copy downloaded copy of the WF Physical Infrastructure document.

Though it does give a good description and case for the project, costs are miles lower and the project go live date has been missed by many years now.

I`d also like to speak that afternoon on the `The scale of Housing Growth` in favour of submissions by Gordon Turpin and David Matson.

Then on the morning of Thursday 9th March I`d like to speak on Air Pollution in relation to the public`s right to know where and to use all footpaths in the Borough.

In the afternoon I wish to speak on Built Environment and Heritage, to avoid developers seeking to shut off access to the historic paths in the Borough.

Then finally on Tall Buildings, where the council seems to have, to quote the HPPG`s submission, been `tone deaf` to the concerns of residents and those of HPPG, but to have increased the housing targets by 46.25%. Given that our concerns have not been addressed

in the revised Local Plan, and the significant increase in the housing targets, our reservations as to the soundness of the Local Plan as articulated in our letter of 20th November 2020 still stand.

This despite an overwhelming percentage support when we in Highams Park voted in a local referendum in favour of the guidance set out in the Highams Park Neighbourhood Plan, and which has been formally accepted by WF Council.
