ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 SECTION 9 EXPERIMENTAL TRAFFIC ORDER LARKSHALL ROAD AND SIMMONS LANE NO WAITING "AT ANY TIME" (T5(24))

The Waltham Forest (Free Parking Places, Loading Places and Waiting, Loading and Stopping Restrictions)
(Amendment No. 198) Experimental Order 2024

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Council of the London Borough of Waltham Forest on **15**th **February 2024** made the above-mentioned Order under sections 9, 10 and 124 of and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, as amended. The experimental Order mentioned above will come into force from **22**nd **February 2024** and may continue in force for up to 18 months.

The general effect of the Order would be to provide double yellow line "at any time" waiting restrictions on:

both sides of **Larkshall Road E4** between the common boundary of No. 5 Heritage Villas and No. 52 Larkshall Road and its junction with Simmons Lane; and

on both sides of **Simmons Lane E4** between its junction with Larkshall Road and the common boundary of Nos. 68 and 70 Simmons Lane.

Documents giving more detailed particulars of the experimental Traffic Order and other measures can be inspected on request by either emailing traffic.scheme@walthamforest.gov.uk, or visiting the Highways and Traffic Management office, Low Hall. Argall Avenue E10 7AS during normal office hours on Mondays to Fridays inclusive (*by appointment); from 15th February 2024; or alternatively documents can be viewed online at: traffic-schemes-and-consultations.

Where it appears necessary for certain purposes, an authorised officer of the Council may, in pursuance of section 10(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, modify or suspend any provision of the experimental Traffic Orders while they are in force.

The Council will be considering in due course whether the provisions of the experimental Traffic Order should be continued in force indefinitely by means of a permanent Traffic Order made under section 6, 45, 46 and 124 of and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. Any person may object to the making of the permanent Order for the purpose of such indefinite continuation within a period of six months beginning with the day on which the experimental Order comes into force or, if the Order is varied by another Order or modified pursuant to section 10(2) of the 1984 Act, beginning with the day on which the variation or modification or the latest variation or modification came into force. Any such objection must be made in writing and must state the grounds on which it is made and be sent to: Traffic Orders, Highways, Low Hall, Argall Avenue, London, E10 7AS, or by emailing: traffic.scheme@walthamforest.gov.uk quoting reference T5(24) – 60 Larkshall Road development. Any objection may be communicated to, or be seen by, other persons who may be affected.

If any person wishes to question the validity of the Order or of any of their provisions on the grounds that they are not within the powers conferred by the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, or that any requirement of that Act or any instrument made under that Act has not been complied with, that person may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Order is made, apply for the purpose to the High Court.
